Assisted Decision Making

The Assisted Decision-Making (Capacity) Act 2015 establishes a new legal framework for supported decision-making in Ireland. It allows people to make legal agreements on how they can be supported to make decisions about their personal welfare, property and affairs. These new regulations may help you, if you don't have the capacity to make decisions, now or in the future, without help.

You lack the capacity to make a specific decision if you are unable to:

- Understand the information relevant to the decision
- Retain information long enough to make a choice
- Weigh that information in making the decision, or
- Communicate your decision

You do not lack capacity simply because you need information to be explained to you in an appropriate way considering your circumstances

The Decision Support Service is a public service that promotes the rights and interests of people who may need support with decision-making. The Decision Support Service:

 Regulates and registers decision support arrangements

Decision support is important for the key decisions being made by a person in areas such as property matters and personal welfare. All members of the public can avail of the Decision Support Service which mainly provides its services on-line but they can also be contacted by phone, post or email where required.

In certain cases it may be important to register your decision support arrangements. In particular it may be important to understand how key services view decisions and the role of carers in that decision making process. For example an issue may arise when a service provider or a bank asks who is deciding an issue pertaining to a person with special needs and may require that the issue is formalised via the decision support service.

In most instances the decision support arrangement for people with special needs can be registered by accessing the online portal and the process is simple and straight forward. To date more than 3,000 decision support arrangements have been registered with the
